The Early Years

Jerome was built on Cleopatra Hill on top of what was the largest copper mine in Arizona - it produced an astonishing three million pounds of copper per month.

Prehistoric Native Americans were the first miners, seeking colored stones. The Spanish followed, seeking gold but finding copper. Anglos staked the first claims in the area in 1876, and United Verde mining operations began in 1883, followed by the Little Daisy claim. Once known as

the wickedest town in the west, Jerome grew rapidly from a tent city to a prosperous town as it

followed the swing of the mine's fortunes.

The mines, the workers and those who sought its wealth, formed Jerome's history. They were a brave and raucous mix. Men and women from all over the world made their way to Arizona to find work and, maybe, a new way of life.

Americans, Mexicans, Croatians, Irish, Spaniards, Italians, Chinese - over twenty nationalities - made the mining camp a cosmopolitan mix that added to its rich life and filled its streets with excitement

Miners, smelter workers, freighters, gamblers, bootleggers, saloon keepers, storekeepers, prostitutes and preachers, wives and children - all made Jerome



The Ghost City

Jerome was the talk of the territory . . . boomtown of its time...darling of promoters and investors. The mines were nourished and exploited by financiers who brought a billion dollars worth of copper from its depths. Gold, silver, lead, zinc, azurite and malachite also contributed to the wealth. It has been said that the copper returns were pure profit because all the operating expenses were covered by the extraction of the other minerals.

> Changing times in the territory saw pack burros, mule-drawn freight wagons, and horses replaced by steam engines, autos and trucks.

Founded in 1876, Jerome was once the fourth largest city in the Arizona Territory.

In 1882, Jerome's first postmaster named the town after the family of financier, Eugene

Fires ravaged the clapboard town again and again. Between 1894 and 1899, four disastrous fires destroyed large sections of the town. Jerome was always rebuilt, but as a result,

the town of Jerome was incorporated in 1899.

By 1918, underground mining was augmented by Arizona's first open pit mine after an uncontrollable fire had erupted in one of the tunnels. The fire burned for over 20 years until the smelter was moved to Clarkdale. In the meantime, dynamite blasts rattled the hills.

In the late 1930's, an enormous charge of dynamite (260,000 pounds) was set off - equal to six freight car loads - and the surface began to shift. Tunnels under the town, some as deep as 4,800 feet below the surface, began to crack. The shifting, combined with the 30-degree incline of the mountainside, pulled a number of buildings down the slope, and entire sections of the business district collapsed or slid downhill.



Jerome's famous "Sliding Jail" moved downhill 225 feet and sat in the middle of Hull Avenue until a bulldozer moved it to its final resting place across the road from its original site. There are still 88 miles of tunnels under the town, and there are four geological faults in the area.

The population peaked at 15,000 in the 1920's, but within 10 years it would drop to less than 5,000. The Depression of the 1930's slowed the mining operation and in 1935, the company was purchased by Phelps Dodge for \$20,800,000. World War II brought increased demand for copper, but after the war, demand slowed.

Dependent on the ups and downs of copper prices, labor unrest, depressions and wars, Jerome's mines finally closed in 1953.

After "King Copper" left town, the population went from a peak of 15,000 in the 20's, to some 50 persons in the late 50's. Within five years of the mine's closing, Jerome became the largest ghost town in America.

Today's Jerome

Jerome has always been a survivor. Reluctant to leave a lifetime of memories, those few hardy souls that remained promoted the town as a historic ghost town.

The 60's and 70's were the time of the counter culture, and Jerome offered a haven for artists who renovated homes and opened abandoned shops to sell their wares. Soon newcomers and Jerome old-timers were working together to bring Jerome back.

The Jerome Historical Society (formed in 1953, the year the mines closed) guarded the buildings against vandalism and the elements. The Douglas Mansion was made a state park in 1965, and in 1967, Jerome was designated a National Historic District by the federal government.

Still lingering in its entirety, Jerome is a colorful oasis, and a photographer's paradise. Looking like an Italian mountain village with an assemblage of Victorian properties, many of the buildings that currently house present-day businesses are those built after the fires of 1894 and 1899 - its appearance hasn't changed much in nearly 100 years. Many of the buildings have been restored and more are planned for restoration.

On the other hand, Jerome's personality has changed dramatically in the past 30 years. Once a thriving mining
